NATIONAL SECURITY FILE (NSF)

This file was the working file of President Johnson's special assistants for national security affairs, McGeorge Bundy and Walt W. Rostow. Documents in the file originated in the offices of Bundy and Rostow, and their staffs, in the various executive departments and agencies, especially those having to do with foreign affairs and national defense, and in diplomatic and military posts around the world.

More than two-thirds of the National Security File has been processed. JOHN McCONE MEMORANDA

This collection, part of the Papers of Lyndon B. Johnson, consists of notes of sixty-eight Presidential meetings attended by Director of Central Intelligence John McCone between November 23, 1963, and McCone's resignation on April 28, 1965. In addition, there are notes for four Presidential meetings which one or more of McCone's key aides attended in his stead.

Ranging from NSC meetings to smaller gatherings of foreign policy advisers to McCone's meetings alone with the President, the meetings concern a great variety of international issues, with Vietnam a prominent topic. McCone himself prepared the notes for fifty-seven of the meetings. In the other fifteen cases, the notes were prepared by one of the aides (such as William Colby, Desmond Fitzgerald, Marshall Carter, or Ray Cline), who attended the meeting with McCone or in his place.

Mr. McCone gave the collection of notes to President Johnson in 1969 to assist the former President with the preparation of his memoirs, The Vantage Point.

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RECORDS OF THE U.S. ARMS CONTROL AND DISARMAMENT AGENCY

The Library holds 20 rolls of microfilm of USACDA records. Rolls 1 through 6, which are open for research, contain the records of the Conference of the 18-Nation Committee on Disarmament, 1964-1968, including final verbatim records of meetings and documents issued by the Conference.

Rolls 7-20, which include such USACDA records as incoming and outgoing telegrams, memos for the Committee of Principals, records of Research Council meetings, and background papers for the 18-Nation Committee on Disarmament, are security classified and not available for research. The original records are at USACDA in Washington.

The Library also holds three reports that include synopses of USACDA contract research. One report, dealing with unclassified research, is open.

ORAL HISTORY COLLECTION

Transcripts of oral history interviews may be consulted at the Library or borrowed by mail. Up to four oral history transcripts can be borrowed through the mail for two weeks at a time. The RAC Project File contains photocopies of documents opened in whole or in part by the Remote Archives Capture declassification program from those collections that are not yet open for research. Under the RAC project, over 650,000 pages of documents at the LBJ Library were scanned and transmitted to Washington, D.C. for declassification review. Periodically, the reviewed material is returned to the Library and processed by our staff as part of our on-going declassification efforts.
