INTRODUCTION

This list includes the principal files in the Johnson Library that contain material relating to Nuclear Power and Nuclear Weapons. It is not definitive, however, and researchers should consult with the Library's archivists and seek out other potentially useful files. (See also guides on Arms Control & Disarmament; Science & Technology; Space; and other related topics and individuals.) This guide includes those collections that have been opened in part or in whole, as well as those collections that are currently unprocessed or unavailable. Collections that have been opened in part or in whole are marked with an asterisk (*).

LYNDON BAINES JOHNSON ARCHIVES, 1931-1958 (LBJA)

In 1958 the Johnson staff began a records management program that included a plan to dispose of non-current files. The staff set up the Lyndon Baines Johnson Archives (LBJA) to house items to be retained rather than scheduled for disposal. Files from Johnson's House and Senate tenure screened, and selected files and items were moved to the LBJA file. Between 1958 and 1963 the staff continued to add to LBJA. During the White House period, items were occasionally added. The LBJA comprises four parts: a Congressional file; a Famous Names file; a Selected Names file; and a Subject File.

More than half of the National Security File has been processed. Folders whose titles are preceded by an asterisk (*) have been processed and their contents declassified in whole or in part. Lists of classified documents have been placed in folders, and you may request mandatory review of individual documents that have not yet been declassified in full. Those folders not preceded by an asterisk (*) are unprocessed and are not subject to mandatory declassification review. Please consult with an archivist for information on the processing schedule.
